While it is natural that the First ward people should want the proposed new school building located near the center of their ward, the Second ward people are also deeply interested. Instead of being too much. the amount asked for is, if anything, too small. The proposition of some people to have three or four little "dinky" schools scattered all over town is absurd. when the size of the town is considered. It will be no more of a hardship for the children of the south end of town to walk as far as Fourth avenue that it will be for those living in the northwest and northeast parts of town. which will furnish nearly twice as many pupils for the new school building as will the south end of town.
