Ordinance No. 62.

An Ordinance termed the Annual Appropriation Bill, appropriating such sums of money as are deemed necessary to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, as shown by estimates heretofore made by such city for the current year. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud:

Section 1. That the following sums of money be, and the same hereby are appropriated from the amount of taxes authorized to be levied and levied for the current year of 1907, to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the said city of Red Cloud for the current fiscal year for the objects and purposes hereinafter stated:

For officers' salaries.....	\$1250 00
For streets and alleys.....	500 00
For litigation.....	250 00
For supplies and printing.....	1200 00
For maintenance of water works.....	900 00
For interest on water bonds.....	9 00
For interest on electric light bonds.....	9 00
For contingent and incidental expenses.....	500 00
For judgment fund.....	120 00
For street lights.....	1200 00
For maintenance of electric light works.....	600 00

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law. Passed and approved July 3rd, 1907.
