

Deaths and Funerals.

Margaret Lightfoot

On Thursday, July 11, 1907, at Bethany, near Lincoln, Nebraska, Mrs. Margaret Lightfoot departed this life and entered into rest with the people

Margaret Yeomans was born in Bergen county, New Jersey, October 12,

There her early life was passed and on August 17, 1842, she was united in marrage with James Stewart, coming with him and their four children four years later to Illinois, where they purchased a farm under the new preemption laws of the United States. To the home they made amid the privations of early settlers came four other children, one of whom, a daughter, died at the age of four years.

In January, 1856, her husband died. and she heroically took up the task of supporting her family of five children, the eldest too young to assist, the youngest but little more than two years

Bereft of the education of the schools, in some school of self reliance and sacrifice she had gained an ability to plan. and the power to do, to perform, and few indeed of those who knew her are the best on the market. hand or indomitable energy and force of will than was displayed by her through a long and useful life.

She lived to see all her six children grown and settled in life, and rejoiced in the possession of 18 grand-children and 14 great-grand-children. She lived to see the prairie home in Illinois become the center of a rich domain, unequalled for beauty and value by any agricultural lands in the United States. the wealth of every acre enhanced by the work of her patient hands and fulfilling the hopes of her faithful heart.

With her husband she united with the Baptist church at Paw Paw. Illinois many years ago.

Coming to Nebraska in 1879, where three of her daughters were living, in 1883 she was joined in marriage to John Lightfoot and afterwards transferred her membership to the Christian church in this city, where it ever after wards remained.

Mr. Lightfoot died in 1896, since which time she has had her home in Red Cloud. She is survived by two daughters and one son.

"She hath done what she could; her children rise up and call her blessed. A crown of righteousness is her reward, for she loved the appearing of her Lord. A crown of Glory that fadeth not away".

George Houchin.

George W. Houchin, aged 77, died Wednesday night at his home in Garfield, the result of a stroke of paralysis. Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, conducted by Revs. Hummel and Waggoner, and interment was in the Waggoner cemetery. Members of the G. A. R., of which organization he was a member, also assisted at the service. The funeral was largely attended.
