

NEARING THE FINISH

Candidates Are on the Anxious Seat And Want It Over.

The present campaign has been the most exasperating to candidates in the history of the county. The new primary law has "balled" things up so that none of the candidates can give even a guess at how they are going to come out. Of course the candidates who are up for re-election have cause to feel that they will win out, but the new candidates have no way of estimating their strength.

E. U. Overman, candidate for the Republican nomination for district judge, has put up a harder fight than any of the other local candidate, and by all rights should have the support of every Republican voter in Webster county. Mr. Overman is the equal of any of the other candidates in legal learning, is known to everybody, and he has a record as a campaigner that would guarantee his election if he should receive the nomination. In addition to the solid vote of Webster county, he will have strong support in each of the other counties of the district outside of Adams, where Mr. James will hold the main part of the votes. It is conceded that Mr. Overman would be the strongest candidate the Republicans could nominate, but the big vote of Adams county is going to make the result doubtful until the votes are counted. For this reason it is the duty of every Republican in this county to go to the polls next Tuesday and assist in nominating Mr. Overman.

In the local contest there is no doubt of the re-nomination of Sheriff Hedge, Treasurer Frahm and Mrs. Caster on the Republican ticket, while County Clerk DeTour and Circuit Clerk Hutchinson will undoubtedly be re-nominated by the demo-pops. Judge Edson will not have such an easy time. L. A. Haskins is making a hard fight for the nomination of county judge, and, as he has hosts of friends over the county, he has a chance to snatch either the Populist or Democratic nomination from Judge Edson, and in that event it would make things easy for the Republican nominee, whoever he may be.

It is a "toss-up" between Ino B. Stanser and J. S. Gilham as to who will receive the Republican nomination for county judge. Mr. Gilham is a lawyer of undoubted ability, and Mr. Stanser, while not an attorney, has a reputation for fairness and good judgment.

The four-cornered fight for the Republican nomination for county clerk makes that nomination the most doubtful one of all. All the candidates are well known and honorable citizens of the county. But what is the use of guessing? None of us will know who are the successful candidates until the votes are all counted.

State Fair Notes.

From the fact that 124 horses were named in the stake races May 1, the races of this fair promise to greatly exceed any had for the past ten years.

In the county relay race each county is represented by four men, each of whom will run 220 yards, making the combined race one-half mile in length.

Secretary Mellor has secured Charles Strobel and his airship, which are now making flights at the Jamestown exposition, to make daily flights at the State Fair.

The track meet at the State Fair will be an entirely new feature and is open to all amateurs. The events to be contested are—100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, 880 yard run, mile run, 2 mile run, 120 yard hurdle race, 220 yard hurdle race, county relay race.

During the State Fair, the first week in September, the city of Lincoln, that boasts the most brilliantly lighted business streets in the United States, will provide street illumination far in excess of those had last year. The preparations contemplate myriads of electric lights on all the principal streets, with free modern vaudeville attractions at the various street corners.

The State Fair Board has appropriated several hundred dollars to carry out the meet, and gold, silver and bronze medals handsomely engraved, will be provided for the winners of first, second and third places respectively. The members of the team winning the county race will each receive a gold medal. Entrance to the grounds will be given to all contestants for days on which they compete. Each contestant must be a member of the Amateur Athletic Union or the Athletic League of North America. Registration can be made, provided he is an amateur, by the payment of 25 cents, through George M. Pinneo, care Y. M. C. A., Lincoln, Neb.

September 2-6 will be seen the largest State Fair ever held in Nebraska. The entries to date are
