

TRY TO HOLD UP TRAIN

One Bandit Is Captured and Another Wounded by Posse.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 18.—An attempt was made to hold up the west-bound Northern Pacific train eleven miles east of Spokane about 1 a. m. Three men attempted to flag the train, but the engineer refused to stop. Harry Draper, with a posse and his bloodhounds, hurried to Trent in a special train. A freight train was stopped and three men started to flee from it. One man, D. H. Murphy, was caught by Draper and it is believed one robber was wounded. The bloodhounds followed the men five miles. Under a bridge near Trent the officers found five dynamite bombs, some fuses and some safe crackers' appliances.

CRITICAL SITUATION AT TEHERAN

Constitutionalists Erect Barricades Around Parliament Buildings.

Teheran, Dec. 18.—The situation here has become more threatening. The reactionaries have taken possession of and are now holding the gun square and open places in the vicinity of the palace, while the constitutionalists to the number of about 10,000 have erected barricades extending for miles around the parliament buildings. The latter are acting solely on the defensive and in an orderly manner. The rough elements are aiding the reactionaries and several murders and some looting has occurred.

Attorneys Fight in Court.

San Jose, Cal., Dec. 18.—District Attorney James S. Sex and Attorney A. H. German of the defense each called the other a liar and threw books and inkstands at each other's heads during a bribery trial. A missile hurled by Sex missed its mark and struck an aged spectator, Zachariah Tucker, on the head. Tucker fell insensible. His skull is fractured and he may not recover. The combatants were arrested.

Coyne Sentenced for Perjury.

St. Louis, Dec. 18.—Charged with perjury because he "could not remember" when questioned by the grand jury concerning alleged hoodling in the house of delegates, William R. Coyne, once a member of Tammany Hall and prominent in local politics, was convicted by a jury and sentenced to two years in prison.

Collecting Funds for Powers.

Lincoln, Dec. 9.—The latest collector to strike Lincoln is a man who says his name is B. W. Cress. He is trying to get money to help out Caleb Powers of Kentucky, who is being tried for the murder of Governor Goebel of that state. He said Robert Cowell of Omaha was chairman of the committee to look after the money contributed.

Crete Gets Reduced Rate.

Lincoln, Dec. 7.—The state railway commission issued an order against the Burlington railroad to compel it to put in a 15-cent rate from Lincoln to Crete and return on cotton goods to be used by the Lincoln Shirt and Overall company of Lincoln. The company asked for a 10-cent rate, the rate at this time being 20 cents.

Bosworth Testifies in Walsh Trial.

Chicago, Dec. 14.—C. M. Bosworth, a national bank examiner, took the stand in the trial of John R. Walsh and described conditions which he found to exist in the Chicago National bank when he examined its affairs in 1904 and 1905. He asserted that Walsh had been repeatedly warned by him and by the comptroller of the currency to unload the over-supply of securities carried by the bank, but that the warnings went unheeded, while conditions became steadily worse.

McBrien Not Candidate.

Lincoln, Dec. 16.—State Superintendent of Public Instruction J. L. McBrien has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-nomination before the next Republican state primaries. A number of educators of Nebraska have cast longing eyes toward this position and to ease their minds the decision is made at this time. Mr. McBrien will probably engage in normal work of some kind.

Search On for Lost Mail.

Omaha, Dec. 14.—Postoffice Inspector L. A. Thompson arrived in Omaha to take up the matter of the missing letter pouches lost from a screen mail wagon between the Omaha postoffice and the Union station. The missing pouches contained ordinary letter mail destined for Nebraska and Colorado points. There were about 2,000 letters in the two pouches.

Chops Hole in Ice and Plunges In.

Lyons, Neb., Dec. 14.—Frenzied by the fear that she would be compelled to end her days in an insane asylum, Mrs. Charles Wehrer of South Omaha drowned herself in the Logan creek, after preparing her watery grave by chopping a hole in the ice.

Unanimous for Postal Savings Banks.

Lincoln, Dec. 17.—Three hundred answers in reply to questions sent out by the Lincoln Commercial club show that the sentiment for postal savings banks, is unanimous.
