

City Election.

On next Tuesday the voters of Red Cloud will be called upon to decide whom they will have for officers for the ensuing year and also decide the policy of the city with regard to license or no license. The issue is square cut, it is not a question of which are the men who in your judgment will make the best officers for the city, but whether or not license shall be granted or not. Those who are opposed to the granting of license should vote for Wm. Wolfe for mayor, J. A. McArthur for councilman in the second ward or Henry Diederich and Wm. McKimney in the 1st ward, while those who favor the granting of license should vote the Republican ticket. That there may be no misunderstanding we wish to say that the Chief is opposed to the granting of license, believing that it is for the best interest of the community.

There has been quite a mix up and considerable guessing done as to who would be the candidates finally to be voted for but the political atmosphere has at last cleared and we find that the following are the nominees:

Republican ticket, for mayor, J. O. Caldwell; clerk, Jas. Burden; treasurer J. O. Butler; Councilmen 1st ward, Ed Amack and E. J. Pulsifer. Councilman 2nd ward, Chas. Robinson.

On the citizens ticket Wm. Wolfe fills the place made vacant by the resignation of W. B. Cramer and H. Newberg for councilman in 1st ward; the other councilmen have withdrawn from the citizens ticket.

Then there is the ticket which has been nominated by petition consisting of Wm. Wolfe, mayor; L. H. Fort, clerk; J. O. Butler, treasurer; Henry Diederich and Wm. McKimney, councilmen in 1st ward and J. A. McArthur, councilman in 2nd ward.

On the school board Frank Studebaker and Henry Newhouse were nominated by the republicans, and L. A. Haskins by the citizens convention. I. H. Hehnes and Henry Gilham have been put on by petition. On the school board we have something to say in another part of this paper.
