It must be confessed that the article in the Argus of last week in regard to the school board was read with some chagrin. (With apologies to the introductory sentence of the article in ques-

We agree entirely with the Argus when it says it is unbecoming for any officer to resent the action of a taxpayer when he invokes the attention of the courts fairly to protect himself, but when that taxpayer so far forgets himself in his zeal as to provoke resentment we believe it is an entirely different affair. For instance, those who brought suit against the district declared that the members of the board were not the officers of the district at all, but were a set of pretenders, that they were bankrupting the district and prays that a receiver be appointed to save the people. Such an attitude invites hostility.

We fail to understand what the editor of the Argus refers to when he States that the action of Mr. Cather 42 78 Compelled an admission on the part of he board that they were entertaining designs of something or another. If he meant location he is clearly wrong for every body knew that the board had bargained for a block of ground; if he meant the policy of conducting the schools he is wrong again for everybody knew that the new building must be used either for high school and ward or else central grade.


