On the heavy wind of the storm which passed over this city Monday evening, says the McCook Tribune, was a swarm of unknown insects. The insects, so far as we can learn from those who saw them, were like what are commonly called "snake-feeders." Some thought they were grass-hoppers—there were some grasshoppers among them—but, while no one, so far as we know, succeeded in catching one of the insects, most agree that they were not grasshoppers, but resembled the "snake-feeder," so commonly called in the east. There were millions of them and they passed from north to south.

Present conditions among swine breeders indicate that the herds are seriously menaced with outbreaks of cholera. The weather conditions are most favorable for such outbreaks. Very sudden changes from cool weather to extreme heat and the reverse, with dry runs where it is almost if not entirely impossible to keep down dust, and a low state of the water supply, all tend to bring about that debilitated condition of the hog's system which makes outbreaks of disease easy, and its fatality very great. Under such conditions we are not surprised to hear of centers of contagion appearing, which indicate that the west may be swept by a cholera epidemic not less destructive than that of 1896.—Nebraska Farmer.

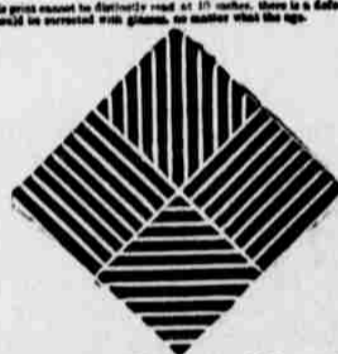
