**MORE OR LESS PERSONAL.**

The publishers of the papers in this city this week made uniform advertising rates which will be found at the head of page four of this issue. Under the new rate churches and charitable societies will be given ten lines of locals free for entertainments wherein they derive the entire benefit, but if they want more than ten lines the cost will be 24 cents per line. For locals of an entertainment wherein a church or other society gets a per cent of the receipts and the promoter or promoters get a per cent the charge will be five cents per line straight. Some may think this rate a little high for that class of advertising but we believe we are just as much entitled to our pay for our work of advertising them as the promoters are entitled to their pay for getting up the entertainment. We are expected to live and pay our bills with what we get for our advertising just the same as the promoters are expected to live and pay their bills with their share of the receipts of the work, and we can see no justifiable reason why the publisher should divide his share of the receipts with the church or society and promoter, each of which receive a part of it when their advertising is not paid for. While we are ready and willing to help churches, societies, etc., along at all times, we do not feel that we are doing justice to ourselves when we help along traveling troupes and promoters who generally reap the lion's share, and hence the charge of 5 cts per line.  
 At a meeting of the city council held on Wednesday evening it was decided to advertise for bids for the hauling of gravel to be used to cover Webster St. between Third and Fourth avenue to a depth of about four inches. This will be what might be called an experimental piece of work, for the purpose of finding out if coarse gravel will make a solid roadbed. At other places it has been tried and found to be a very acceptable mode of paving at a low cost. While gravel may be a hard thing to pull a load through until it once becomes packed solidly it eventually makes an excellent road and streets paved with it are generally free from mud. In fact it eventually becomes about equal to an asphalt pavement and the cost would not exceed \$150.00 per block. We hope the experiment work will prove successful and the entire business part of town at least will be treated likewise.  
 An item which we failed to mention last week was the marriage of Miss Emma L. Cook formerly of this city to Mr. Willis W. Robertson of Primrose, Iowa, which happy event took place at the home of Mrs. Hammord of that city on March 29th, the Rev. W. L. Byers officiating. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Cook of this city and a graduate of our high school and has for some time past been engaged in teaching in Iowa. She is well and favorably known here and the happy pair have the best wishes of many friends here who along with the CHIEF extend congratulations and best wishes.
