Sheriff Simmering today received a dispatch from Detective Malone of Lincoln, saying he had three or four fellows under arrest whom he thought belonged to the band. It is thought the robber's roost is a branch of the band of robbers that was captured in Hanover, Kansas, about a year and a half ago."
