Weather of the State. General summary of the weather and crop conditions over the state as reported by the state observer at Lincoln: The past week has been cool, with showers in nearly all parts of the state. The average daily temperature deficiency was about 1 degree. The maximum temperature the first days of the week slightly exceed 90 degrees but the last of the week were about or below 85 degrees. The rain fall has been above normal in most counties touching the Platte river and, with few exceptions, below normal in other counties. The harvest rainfalls occurred in Gosper, Buffalo and Platt counties, where between 2 and 3 1-2 inches fell. The past week has been another excellent growing week. In most parts of the state it has been a good week for harvesting. Most of the rye and winter wheat in central and southern counties has been cut. Threshing has been commenced in southern counties. A few yields of winter wheat are reported and they vary from five to thirty bushels per acre. The oat harvest has commenced in the central and is nearing completion in the southern counties. Corn has continued to grow rapidly in all parts of the state. Tassels begin to show in most fields in the central counties, and the silk is appearing and ears are forming in southern counties.
