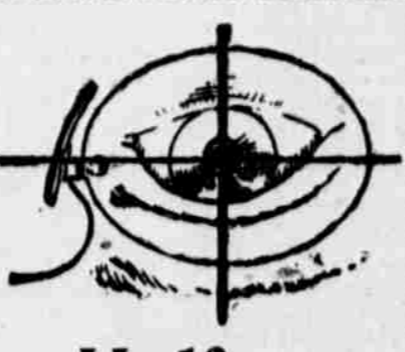

The following from the McCook Tribune will be of interest to our readers as the lady mentioned was at one time a resident of this city: "A dispatch from Monmouth, Illinois, appearing under the date of July 16th, brings the sad news of the death of Mrs. J. C. Allen, wife of our former townsman, by her own hand, last Sunday afternoon. The unfortunate woman is believed to have been mentally unbalanced. Death was caused by inhaling illuminating gas. After leaving Nebraska, Mr. Allen became one of the leading and most prominent dry goods merchants of Monmouth. He will have the sympathy of his many friends in Nebraska in the sad tragedy that has overwhelmed his home in Illinois. For some time past the health and mind of Mrs. Allen have been such that constant attendance was required. Yesterday her husband drove to Burlington. Later Mrs. Allen persuaded her attendant to go to church. Upon her return the doors were locked and a strong odor of gas pervaded the premises. Breaking open the door the body was found locked in a room where were four open gas jets. Investigation showed that every gas jet in the house had been turned on full force."

### Rock Island to Make Extensions.

The following article taken from the World Herald of Thursday revives the idea that has always been held by our people that the Rock Island would sooner or later build from Nelson to some point in Kansas. This city and the surrounding country will be ready to give the Rock Island a warm welcome if she will build through here. "Local railroad officials were somewhat stirred up yesterday by the apparently authentic report from Topeka that the Rock Island is to build a cut-off from Nelson, Neb., to Almena, Kan., and by the building of the line save seventy miles between the two points." "In discussing the matter a Rock Island official said: "If the line is constructed it will give us the shortest route from Omaha or Kansas City into A. N. Totton, one of the traveling salesmen for the Olney-Gaston Co. is sojourning in our city for a few days. Denver. I knew the matter had been discussed somewhat, but did not know just what had been done as the operating department of our line is not located in Omaha. While the Rock Island is getting its share of business to Colorado, if the proposed line is constructed there will be no reason why our line should not be the choicest one to take west out of either Omaha or Kansas City."

The territory through which the proposed line may be constructed is of easy grade and the cost of construction will be small in comparison with other portions of the system.

Railroad officials of other lines than the Rock Island have little faith in the proposed new line, but say if it is built that the Rock Island will find when it gets into Denver on a run from the Missouri river that there will be other engineers on other railroads entering the union depot at the same time its trains arrive.
