SAVINGS VS GETTINGS.

If our present county clerk's record is as good as advertised what is the use of using balf a newspaper to explain it. A clean record will speak for itself. We have heard no one vil-Harry Sowter returned Monday from lifying the present clerk's record, and are willing to accept bis statement that he is "saving the county money," and turning back to the treasurer more "surplus fees" than any previous clerk, until we have investigated and found that such is not the case. To tell the truth we do not see why he should not turn back more fees, as he has had \$100 for attending the commissioners each quarter, regardless of whether the other fees of the office were sufficient to pay the expenses or not. The former clerks have only but in claims for this fee when other accruing fees would not pay the accruing expenses, viz: salary of clerk and deputy and extra help. And aside from this the business of the office has increased to such an extent as to require the services of two deputies, or at least two of them are retained there permanently. The fees for each quarter this year have been including the

Now deduct from this last sum the \$300 in fees that were drawn as clerk of the board for these three quarters, or nine months, and which under the circumstances when the other fees were sufficient to pay the current expenses of the office should not have been drawn, and you will find that the excess fees amount to just \$21 85 for nine months. The last statement of the county clerk showed a balance in fees in his hands of \$655 35, a portion of which was carried over from the year 1898. The annual statement made to the county board for 1898 shows that the total of fees collected for the year, including the \$400 fee for acting as clerk of the county tures for the same year were salary of clerk, \$1,500.00; deputy clerk, \$700.00, The bride was formerly one of Red to at of \$2,480. This latter amount decess fees for the past three quarters makes the sum total of the excess fees in his hands on October 1st, 1899, to be Now had the present county clerk did as his predecessors and accepted this fee only when necessary, where would this enormous sum have been at present? Has the county made any saving through the operation, or is it merely a transfer of funds for appearance sake, to swell the receipts and make the average person think wonders had been acco.nplished? One thing is certain, and that is that according to his own reports he has drawn the fee regularly whether he needed it to meet expenses or not. If he had done as others did the probabilities are that \$600 of this sum would have remained in the county treasurer's hands without any transfer to the clerk's fee book and then back to the treasurer as excess fees. From the annual report of 1898 it is self evident that at least once the fee was necessary to meet the accrued expenses. There is one thing, however that the quarterly reports do show, and that is that during the twenty-one months last past Webster county has paid for "extra clerk hire" over and above the regular salaries of clerk and deputy clerk to the tune of \$604.00, or an average of about \$29.00 per month. Verily, this is reform with a vengesnee.
