 The people are evidently satisfied with the present county officers with one exception.
 The majority of Mrs. Case, 540, is in all probability, the largest ever received by any candidate running for office in this county.
 The affairs at the various county offices have again assumed an air of business which will continue for a couple of years yet.
 The next Kentucky feud promises to be between the Goebelites and anti-Goebelites, and it is hard to tell just where it will end.
 It is our honest opinion that no one can tell how an election is going by looking over the vote cast at an election one year previous.
 The vote on the state ticket in this county was 233 less than the vote on county treasurer. This may probably account for the fusion increase.
 Kansas republicans make a gain of ten per cent on the local elections. It is easy to predict where the electoral vote of Kansas will be found next year.
 The republicans as a rule expected the fusionists to split their ticket and vote part of the republican ticket and the majorities opposite the names of the lucky ones goes to show that the rule worked both ways.
 Admiral Dewey sprung another surprise on the people yesterday. He took unto himself a better half in the person of Mrs. Mildred M. Hazen, and a grateful public knew nothing about it until after the ceremony had been performed.
 It is still in doubt whether Nebraska or Mississippi is the banner democratic donkey in this glorious union. Mississippi is still a length ahead but no one knows how it will come out when the rural returns get in from the populist strongholds.
 The general result in the twelve States which voted yesterday is satisfactory to the republicans. They carried Iowa, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Ohio, Pennsylvania and South Dakota, while the democrats were successful in Maryland, Mississippi and Nebraska.

State officers were chosen in all of these states. Of the three states—New York, New Jersey and Virginia—which elected legislatures, New York and New Jersey went republican and Virginia was held by the democrats Tuesday's elections are therefore gratifying to the republicans.

A special from Washington says that Bryan's victory in Nebraska gave the republican officials almost as much joy as Ohio's endorsement of McKinley. If Bryan had been beat in Nebraska it would have shelved him, and not unlikely, also the 16 to 1 issue. But Bryan's victory in Nebraska is taken to insure his renomination for the presidency and nothing better than this is desired by the republicans. Bryan is regarded by the republicans as the easiest man for McKinley to beat that the democrats could name.

Owing to the lateness of the time of the completion of the canvass of the official ballots of the election by the canvassing board, we are unable this week to give the tabulated vote of the county, but it will appear next week. The majorities of the lucky ones are as follows:

RETURNS COME IN SLOWLY

But Holcomb Can Read His Title Clear to Judgship.

HIS MAJORITY FROM 12,000 TO 15,000

Many Counties Not Yet Heard From Completely—Judge Neville Wins Out in the Sixth Congressional District—Other Election News.

The returns received Wednesday at the state headquarters show but little change from those first to come in. The complete county returns come in with their usual slowness. Many of the counties are unable to give the final figures on account of the failure of the judges and clerks to preserve copies of the vote before sealing up the records. All of the figures tended to confirm the prevailing impression that Holcomb's majority will not fall below 10,000.

Reasonably complete figures from 53 counties show a majority for Holcomb of 9,502. These same counties gave Poytzer a majority of only 1,082. The fusion gain in these 53 counties is therefore 8,500. The remaining counties will show a smaller vote and the gains will probably not be so strongly marked. These figures indicate that final majority will not be far from 12,000.

The fusionists hold that the belated returns will show largely in Holcomb's favor, and they place his majority above 15,000, and many claim that it will reach 20,000.

LANCASTER COUNTY.

In Lancaster county the republicans elected every county officer except the candidate for county treasurer, Aaron Buckstaff. Mr. Buckstaff received 4,436 votes, while his opponent, William McLaughlin, received 5,041, or a majority of 605.

A hard fight had been made on the republican candidates for sheriff, county judge and treasurer. Z. S. Branson for sheriff received 5,156 votes, while his fusionist opponent, P. H. Cooper, received 4,959, making Mr. Branson's plurality 197. Frank Waters for county judge pulled through with a plurality of 71. Mr. Waters received 5,067 votes and his opponent, Fred Shepherd, received 4,996.

Neville Elected.

The returns from the Sixth district indicate that Judge Neville is running slightly ahead of Holcomb and will have a good safe majority.

Douglas County.

The World-Herald places Holcomb's majority in Douglas county at 739. The paper makes it slightly larger.

Kentucky in Doubt.

Superintendent Miller of the Western Union Telegraph company, who has been collecting the election news of Kentucky, has issued the following bulletin:

The following conclusion reached late last night regarding the election in Kentucky seems to hold good: Returns received give counties not yet heard from in a complete way, ten gave a democratic majority of 3,562 in 1897 and nineteen gave a republican majority of 10,710. Therefore if there is no republican loss in these counties Taylor is elected. A republican loss seems improbable as there are generally republican gains elsewhere.

The Goebel people cling to their claim of a plurality of 5,000 in the state, these figures being the estimate by the nominee himself.

Republican Gains in New York.

The receipt of later returns from Tuesday's election in New York city and the state shows practically no changes from the figures given out last night. In New York county the entire regular democratic ticket was elected by pluralities of about 50,000. Of the assembly districts in New York county the democrats elected thirty-one assemblymen and the republicans four—a democratic gain of four. The republicans will probably have a majority of thirty-four in the assembly—a republican gain of ten.

Nearly a Landslide.

Unofficial returns have been received by the Western Union from all counties in Ohio, with a few scattering precincts estimated. The footings give Nash, republican, for governor, a plurality of 49,305. This is almost a republican landslide.

50,000 in Iowa.

Returns from ninety of the ninety-nine counties of Iowa, with estimates on the others, show that the republican claim of sixty thousand plurality for Governor Shaw is easily maintained.

South Dakota Republican.

Additional reports received Wednesday from points in South Dakota make but little change in the republican majority, increasing it from 3,876 to 4,017.

Senator Carter Fined.

United States Senator Thomas A. Carter was arrested in Helena, Mont., and fined one dollar for spitting on the sidewalk. The complaint was made by a man who had previously been arrested and fined for the same offense.

Revolution Progressing.

Cables received at Caracas, Venezuela, from the Colombia boundary say that the revolution in that republic is progressing. About 2,000 revolutionists have occupied Cucuta and
