Commissioners' Proceedings.

RED CLOUD, Nov. 14, 1899.
Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present: Jerome Vance, Geo. P. Weber, Wm. Irons, Wm. A. May, Chm.; J. P. Hale, clerk.

Petition of Thos. Rhodes and others for road commencing at the township line between sections 5 and 6, thence running one mile south between said sections in town 2, range 12. Petition was granted as prayed for.

On motion, W. H. Rosencrans was instructed to expend not to exceed \$35.00, in opening the road on section line between sections 33 and 34, town 1, range 11.

Petition of Thos. Emigh and others for road on section line between section 6 and 7, town 2, range 10, referred to Vance and Weber.

Petition of S. Birch and others to open up road commencing at the southeast corner of section 6-2-12, laid over for right of way.

Board now adjourned.

November 15th, 9 a. m.; board met; all members present.

On motion, E. B. Smith was ordered to take Thos. Quinn to the poor house.

Petition of M. J. Sheldon and others to open up road commencing at the northwest quarter of 32-2-10, running thence south one mile between sections 81 and 82, referred to Smith and Irons.

On motion, clerk was instructed to issue county warrant to Claus Rose for \$14.50 as refund of illegal taxes.

Board now adjourned to meet November 16th, at 9 a. m.

November 16th, 9 a. m.; board met; all members present.

Now comes E. U. Overman, attorney for Harry McCormel, and files an objection to opening of road at the northeast corner of 7-1-9, and running thence south between sections 7 and 8, and 17 and 18 and terminating at the Republican river, in Webster county, Nebraska.

On motion, the objection was sustained. Jno. Beardsley, of Smith county, Kansas, presents a claim for \$88.35. Clerk was ordered to draw warrant for difference in claim between Webster county, Nebraska, and Smith county, Kansas.

On motion, J. U. Meyer was allowed \$250 for grading road between sections 7 and 18, town 2, range 12.

The following communication was read:

BLUE HILL, Neb., Nov. 15, '99.

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:—The statutes provide that the county board shall establish an office at the county seat for the county attorney, and, having a deputy resident at the county seat, I request your Honorable Body to take the necessary steps to establish such an office.—A. D. Ranney, County Attorney.

On motion, E. B. Smith was authorized to furnish rooms for deputy county attorney as prayed for.

Bond of A. H. Kaley, for justice of peace in Red Cloud city, was approved.

Bond of F. Houchin, as assessor in Garfield precinct, approved.

The county board being convinced that it is for the public good, on motion, ordered that a public road be opened and worked commencing at the northeast corner of 7-1-9, Webster county, Nebraska, and running thence south on the section line to the southeast corner of said section 7, thence west on the south section line of said section to the Republican river.

Moved and carried that the county treasurer is hereby instructed to release judgment in district clerk's office against L. Baum, upon payment of \$50.00; and also authorizing county treasurer to issue tax receipt for the year 1896 for same, reducing the tax of \$53.65 to \$50.
