It is safe to predict that the Philadelphia platform will not be framed by a committee of professional gloom mongers.

Democratic papers are now pushing Dewey as a vice presidential candidate. From the bridge of the Olympia to the tail of Mr. Bryan's kite is a great fall for any man.

In 1895 the world's production of gold was \$17,000,000 less than the world's production of silver. In 1898 the production of gold was \$73,700,000 greater. Not much danger of a scarcity of the yellow metal.

William J. Bryan leads the populist ticket as a candidate for the presidency on a platform that "reaffirms and demands for the reopening of the mints of the United States, to the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of sixteen to one."

The exports of corn in 1895, under a democratic administration were only 28,585,405 bushels. In 1898 and 1899, under a republican administration they averaged over 200,000,000 bushels each year. It is not likely that the farming classes desire to go back to a democratic administration with such comparisons as these staring them in the face.

In 1894 there were only 231,848,506 bushels of wheat retained for home consumption; in 1899 the quantity retained was 452,530,285 bushels. In 1894 there were thousands of people too poor even to buy bread. In 1899 everybody could buy bread. These two comparisons represent the different conditions of the country under democratic and republican administrations.

The populists claim that Bryan could not have carried Colorado, Montana, Nebraska and South Dakota in 1896 without their votes, and predicted the election of Bryan was hopeless should these states be lost by the rejection of the candidacy of Mr. Towne by the Kansas City convention. On the other hand democrats are certain that Towne as a candidate will lose the party more votes in other states. In this contingency why not have two or three candidates for vice president?
