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

He is, however, eagerly looking forward to the happy hunting ground I told him of his namesake, the city, and that it was my town. He seemed pleased and asked me if I owned all the town or only the greater part of it. I was obliged to own up to him that John Polnicky and Oatman were interested with me in the deal. He asked me to buy a pony of him offering it to me for \$5 and a pint of whiskey. Said he wanted the whiskey for his squaw who was sick.
