"He voted for Bryan in 1896," is becoming a very common form of introduction for the speakers at republican meetings this year.

The Lord gave the good crops and the republicans gave the good markets, and no amount of political misrepresentation can deprive either of the due credit.

golden crown of imperialism will have no terrors for the people as long as proof of its existence depends upon the assertion of the Nebraska prophet who said that the gold standard would starve everybody except the money changers and the money makers.

Mr. Bryan did not close his predicting department when he received the election returns of 1896. After his defeat he issued an address in which he said: "Before the year 1900 arrives the evil effects of the gold standard will be more evident than they are now, and the people then ready to demand an American financial policy for the American people, will join with us in the immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1." Has anybody noticed any great rush at the realization entrance of this prediction?

If it had not been for republican expansion Hawaii would not have become a part of the union; if Hawaii had not become a part of the union a Hawaiian delegate would not have sat in the democratic convention and been a member of the platform committee; if it had not been for the vote of this Hawaiian member of the platform committee, the 16 to 1 plank would have been beaten despite the telephone orders from Lincoln; if this plank had been beaten, Bryan, according to his own words, would have refused to run for president. How, therefore, can Bryan logically inveigh against expansion, in view of the fact that he himself is a derivative from it?

The New Ordinances.

The new book of revised ordinances which was recently printed by this office by authority of the city council is one calculated to cover all the needs of a city of this size, and if the ordinances are now enforced it will be all right. The main trouble heretofore has been that there was always a loophole through which any offender could escape when it came to a question of law, and it was this one thing alone that caused the adoption and printing of the new book. The ordinances in the new book are in strict conformity with the provisions of the state law governing cities of this size and while there is a certain class who are always willing to contend that a city ordinance is not worth the paper it is printed on, this class can understand that the council are of the opinion that every ordinance in the new book can and will be enforced. Among the ordinances will be found one providing a dog tax which is undoubtedly a good thing. The cur canine population of this city has increased so of late that it isn't hardly safe to be out during the day, and castor pants are necessary at night. Anyone who has a good dog will not object to paying the tax, but the owners of curs that are good for nothing but to bark and howl will no doubt have a kick coming. We would suggest that this ordinance be rigidly enforced, and it easily can be. All that would be necessary would be to acquaint dog owners with the state law and let them take their choice between the dog tax and the fine imposed by the state law. Other good ones are the building ordinance, damaged and decayed buildings, fire limits, crimes against the city, and it would also be a good plan for several people to acquaint themselves with the provisions and restrictions of the water ordinance. Another is the occupation tax ordinance which was compiled with a special view to canvassers and peddlers, and under which it is thought this class of people can be forced to pay a tax or stay out of the city. The book contains plenty of good laws for a city of this size, none of which are too severe, and we hope the city will enforce every one of them.

Demo Pop Senatorial Conventions.

Last Monday the pop senatorial convention met at the court house in this city and the democratic senatorial convention met at the Holland House in this city. Both conventions met about 2 p.m. and an organization was soon perfected. A committee from the democratic convention called on the pops and broached the subject of fusion, and soon large "gobs" of political harmony were floating through the air at a rate that ran the thermometer up to 102 in the shade. Both crowds were perfectly willing to fuse providing each got the candidate and the other fellows would support him. A conference committee was appointed by the populists and they retired to one of the jury rooms to found an amicable basis for fusion. However they were gone so long that they were forgotten and the convention proceeded to informal ballot for senator. After the informal ballot a Nuckolls county delegate reminded the convention of the conference committee, and suggested that through respect to them no more balloting be done until they reported. The committee reported recommending that both conventions proceed to ballot and that the person receiving the majority of the votes cast in both conventions be declared the nominee. The report was accepted and the balloting began and was kept up until supper time, and a recess taken. After supper the balloting was resumed and continued until—we don't know just when, as we crawled off to bed about 11:30 p.m. However we heard the next morning that O. R. Pitney of Inavale had received the nomination. The nomination by right of precedent belonged to Franklin county and some of the delegates from there went home feeling rather sore, however a number of them went home in excellent spirits—the best that could be had in the town.
