The Omaha Bee Publishing Co. have started a farm journal and the State Journal, not to be behind has started a poultry journal. We have not heard what kind of a paper the Omaha Herald will branch out with to keep in line, but as they have been farming the farmer for some time past they will probably let it go at that.
An agent for the McCormick Reaper Company arrived on the west bound train Monday who was observed to have a bad breaking out on the face. On his arrival up town he was rounded up by Marshal Kinsel and taken to Dr. Moranville for examination. He was found to have had the measles and to have taken cold thus causing him to have erysipelas of the face.
As a further precaution in the matter of the smallpox cases in the county the commissioners were brought together in special session Saturday. A telephone communication was had with Gov. Poynter with the result that the president of the state board of health was sent to look after the matter, arriving here Monday. Sheriff Wells was instructed by the board to see that the several cases were looked after as regards to quarantine and guards according to the advice of Health Officer Towne which has been done. Mr. Towne visited the case in this city, those in Garfield and the one in Guide Rock, all of which he declared to be smallpox, but in a mild form. The young man, Emerton, who has the disease here in the southeast part of town is convalescing, and up-to-date no other members of the household have contracted the disease. The quarantine has been rigidly enforced and no one who wishes to come to the city should fail to do so, as they will be as safe from the disease as in their own household at home.
