WASHINGTON.

THE MOST SEVERE MEASURES TO BE ADOPTED AGAINST THE TREACHEROUS INDIANS.

BERLIN, April 14. It is stated that the Prussian Liberals in Landtag, intend shortly to introduce in that body, a bill looking to a thorough reform in the upper house.

WASHINGTON, April 14. By a general order issued to-day from the War Department, Col. J. C. Davis is appointed to the command of the Department of Columbia, vice Gen. E. B. Canby, killed by the Modoc Indians.

WASHINGTON, April 14. General Sherman expresses himself very emphatically in regard to the treatment which should be given to the Modoc Indians, and feels that the whole power of the Government will be put forth to avenge the death of Gen. Canby and those massacred with him.

NEW YORK, April 14. The news of the murder of General Canby and the peace commissioners, by Captain Jack and his band, produced feelings of the deepest indignation and horror among all classes in this city and vicinity, and was the all absorbing topic of conversation to-day.
