SEFATE. WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. The Senate met at noon, Mr. Car-

penter presiding.
Mr. Edmunds, from the Judicinry Committee, reported back the House bill to repeal the bankrupt law, with amendments, and recommended that the thus amended bill pass. The bill as amended requires concurrence of one-fourth of the insolvent credit-ors to orce bim in a bankruptcy, allows protes ed paper to run sixty days, allows a majority of creditors to take the case out of bankruptcy any time, ond permits any number of credstors to make composition of

their own claims. Mr. Wright introduced a resolution instructing the committee on civil service retrenchment to inquire into the expediency of reporting a bill making a reduction of ten per ceut, of compensation of all government officials whose salaries exceed one thousand per annum or five dollars per day.

Mr. Cameron objected, and it was laid over.

On motion of Mr. Wright, the House salary bill was taken up with amendments reported by the Senate committee on civil service and retrenchment, striking out the first three sections, and substituting therefor sections repealing the act of March 3d, 1873, and fixing the salcompensation of the several heads of departments be eight thousand dol-

A resolution was introduced to the Finance Committee and adopted looking to an addition of the bank ing law to prohibit stockholders and officers of national banks being concerned in private banking business in the locality of a national bank whereby the means of such bank may be employed to advance the rate of in-

Mr. Allison introduced a bill to regulate and facilitate commerce across mavigable rivers forming the boundary of States. It provides that all railroad bridges across such rivers shall be declared public highways, and shall be equally open to the use of every railway having a terminus at or near such bridges upon payment to the owner of such bridge and approaches therete, reasonable compensation under limitation and condi-tions which the bill in detail pre-scribes. Referred.


