WASHINGTON.

The Financial Bill Reaches the Senate.

WASHINGTON, April 16. Mr. Carpenter introduced a joint resolution, declaring that it was the duty of the United States to recognize the independence of Cuba, and that we observe neutrality between the contending parties.

Mr. Scott moved to take up the bill providing for the purchase of bonds of the Louisville and Portland canal.

Mr. Freelinghusen gave notice that he would on Tuesday next move to take up the supplementary civil rights bill, reported on Tuesday last.

The Senate took up and discussed the bill to enable the Menomonees of Russia to effect a permanent settlement on the public lands of the United States.

Mr. Ingalls introduced a bill amending the Act in relation to the United States to provide for the admission of New Mexico as a State.

ROCHESTER, April 16. The Industrial Congress are in session here to-day, and discussed and adopted the following resolutions in two reports.

Resolved, That the Industrial Congress of the United States, representing the producing classes, hereby issue this protest.

Resolved, That we demand the issue of a National circulating medium by the Government directly to the people.

Resolved, That we demand that the Government should issue a national currency, or private character, based on faith and the resources of the country without the intervention of so-called National Banks.

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THE EAST.

The French Steamer Amerique Foundered at Sea.

New York, April 16. The French steamer Amerique from New York to Havre, foundered between Brest and Havre. She left New York April fourth and touched at Brest April 14th.

WASHINGTON, April 16. The House Committee on Indian Affairs, which has been investigating Indian depredations in Texas, has taken a large amount of evidence.

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CABLEGRAMS.

The Remains of the Late Dr. Livingstone Arrive in London.

London, April 16. The remains of the late Dr. Livingstone, which were discovered by the Spaniards in the Andes, arrived in London this evening.

Madrid, April 16. Clement Duvernois, and several other directors of the territorial bank of Spain have been arrested charged with irregularities in the conduct of the affairs of the bank.

Havana, April 16. The Spanish authorities report officially that 2,000 insurgent infantry and 300 cavalry, attacked the Spanish fortified encampment at Ortega, several times on the 7th inst., and retired at night.

London, April 15. Owing to what he regards as unfavorable action of international commission in regard to tolls on tonnage through the Straits of the Leesepe threatens to dismiss his pilots and extinguish lights in light-house, thus virtually closing the canal.

London, April 16. There is believed to have been one hundred men killed at the Dunkinfield mine explosion yesterday.
