JOHN G. BRANDT testified: My name is John G. Brandt; age, 35; my residence is corner of Howard and Tenth streets, Omaha; I do business in the bar room of Turner Hall. The election was held in the big hall of the same building. At about half past one o'clock, I heard that Baumer was two ahead. That was spoken of in my place of business. A man came in the door. I was alone in the bar-room, and he said "There's a chance for you to make \$500.00." "How?" He said "On account of the election. It is so close.'
