Compromise Affected.-All Freight to be Transferred on the Iowa Side.

WASHINGTON, May 1. The Sub-Coummittee of the House, committee on the Pacific railroad, has agreed to a compromise-bill relative to the Omaha bridge and Union Pacific railroad. The substantial features of the compromise are these:

The bridge is to be left as it is at present, as regards to the independent ownership. The security of the bridge bonds is to be undisturbed, and the control of the bridge and tolls are to remain as at present with the Union Pacific Railroad. The Union Pacific Railroad, however, will be compelled to remove the present blockade in the freight transfers at the bridge, and to transfer all freight to the Iowa side.

NEW YORK, May 1. An application was made to Judge Donohue in the Supreme Court Chambers yesterday for an injunc-tion restraining the Union Pacific Railroad from issuing, as they pro-pose to do, sixteen million dollars of sinking fund bonds. The applica-tion was made on behalf of ten millions of income bonds which are payable out of the revenue of the road and fall due September next. It is claimed by them that their only security is their lien on property of the company which would be superceded by mortgage given to secure the payment of sinking bond funds, leaving them to individual respon-sibility of the stockholders in oppo-sition. Exception taken to jurisdiction as none of the company's officers are located in this city. There is also a denial of the charges that the company are unable to meet its obligations. Decision reserved.
