Waltze, a Sentenced Murderer, Attacks His Keeper at Hudson, N. Y., and Fatally Injures Him.

His Escape was Prevented by the Inevitable Interviewing Reporter.

Intense Excitement over the Affair. WASHINGTON.

The Missouri River Railroad Bridge.

A Compromise Affected.—All Freight to be Transferred on the Iowa Side.

WASHINGTON, May 1. The Sub-Committee of the House, committee on the Pacific railroad, has agreed to a compromise-bill relative to the Omaha bridge and Union Pacific railroad.

WASHINGTON, May 1. The bridge is to be left as it is at present, as regards to the independent ownership. The security of the bridge bonds is to be undisturbed, and the control of the bridge and tolls are to remain as at present with the Union Pacific Railroad.

WASHINGTON, May 1. An application was made to Judge Denio in the Supreme Court Chambers yesterday for an injunction restraining the Union Pacific Railroad from issuing, as they propose to do, sixteen million dollars of sinking fund bonds.

PITTSBURGH, May 1. The excitement continues over the butchery at Homestead, yesterday. Ernest Love's alleged man is undoubtedly guilty of the crime. He is a Prussian by birth, twenty-five years old, and has hitherto avoided capture, though \$2,000 reward is offered for him.

LOUISVILLE, May 1. The general Methodist Episcopal Conference of the south, convened this morning at Liberty Hall. About 200 delegates were present, including six bishops, and representing every southern State except Virginia. A delegate offered resolutions for the appointment of a committee to report on what church edifices, parsonages, school buildings, and other property, are held in violation of the rights of the M. E. Church South, and under what circumstances the M. E. Church obtained possession of such property, the point being made that the resolutions are very important, and its discussion was postponed until to-morrow.

WIN. NASH was convicted at Martinez today, of murder in the first degree. Martin Greshack was sentenced to imprisonment for life. The rain fell generally throughout the interior of vast advantage to farmers.

EVANSVILLE, May 1. It is reported here that a large portion of McClansbury, in Adams county, was destroyed by fire to-day. No particulars can be obtained by telegraph to-night.

LOUISVILLE, May 1. A Courier-Journal special says Miles Alfred (colored) who murdered Dr. Alfred, was hanged in Springfield to-day. One hundred deaths are confessed in compliance with Mrs. Alfred to the last.

THE London papers continue statements on the financial question in America, generally counselling a compromise between the inflationists and their opponents.

GUERPH, Ont., May 1. John Sullivan was to-day convicted of reviling on the 18th of April, a girl five years old, and sentenced to be hanged on the 25th of June.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1. It is stated that the famine prevails in Asia Minor in the town of Angoria. One hundred deaths are reported daily there from starvation.

WASHINGTON, May 1. Major Chambers, of the Fourth Infantry, commanding Fort Fetterman, reports that the Arapahoes' camp on Powder River is disastrously supplied with buffalo. A party of Croes stole sixty horses from them. They were followed and three Croes and one Arapahoe killed. The Croes are going to join the Arapahoes, and will probably attack the croes.

WASHINGTON, May 1. Sixteen revolvers were taken from them, and they were placed in the guard house. Gen. Churchill was soon afterwards released. Brooks' force at the State House consists of the 1st Arkansas infantry, 2d Arkansas infantry and a battery of artillery. They have six tons of powder, a large quantity of shot and shell, and thirty days' provisions. Gen. White, of Baxter's force attached a party of Brooks' men to New Goshony yesterday, killing 11, wounding 20 and capturing the remainder. Seven of White's men were killed.

WASHINGTON, May 1. The Inman and National Steamship Companies have determined to withdraw from the Atlantic Steamship conference, and set independently receive the steamer and freight rates. A result of repudiation, will probably be in the reduction of rates.

Hudson, N. Y., May 1. Joseph Waltze, the murderer of Barrett, and Officer Ernest passed an almost sleepless night. The military under Major Davis did guard duty about the jail last night. Their presence helped to quiet the rest of the affair.

The approaches to the jail were filled at an early hour. The prisoner was attired in a suit of clean clothes, and sat sulkily in a corner of his cell awaiting the hour fixed for the execution. His father, mother and sister were in the adjoining room waiting for the last interview. His mother visited him at nine this morning and he showed no sign of recognition and refused to speak to any one.

At 10 o'clock a. m. he was visited by Father O'Driscoll, and his relatives. The funeral service of the Catholic church was recited, when the prisoner, preceded by the priest and accompanied by the jury proceeded to the cell that has been set apart for the execution.

The jury and members of the press arranged themselves around the room, and Waltz, with his arms pinioned, was seated on the chair beneath. The drop-ropes were quickly placed around his neck, and at 10:17, everything being ready, the signal was given, and Joseph Waltz was jerked into the air; there was no violent motion of the body, no shouting, no flight of the hands and arms. Dr. Marcy pronounced life extinct in fourteen minutes. The body was cut down at 11:2 a. m.

The House of Commons will take a recess during the White-tail holidays, resuming on the 12th of May until the 1st of June. The election in Southampton has been annulled on account of bribery and a new election ordered. A grand banquet was given at Portsmouth to-day to the soldiers of the Ashante expedition.

LONDON, May 1. The Daily News says that the "lock-out" of farm laborers, will soon be submitted to arbitration for settlement. The steamship Prussian, which sailed from Liverpool yesterday, for Quebec, took on fifty Warwickshire farm hands, and one hundred and eighty children, to find homes in Canada. The next steamer will carry one hundred and fifty laborers from the agricultural districts.

MADRID, May 1. Official dispatches announce that fighting resumed before Bilbao on Wednesday. Some advanced positions of Carlists have been captured by the Republican force with slight loss.
