Queen Victoria to Visit Ireland

His Imperial Majesty, the Czar of Russia, has arrived here, on a visit to Emperor William. London, May 4. Queen Victoria, with the Duke and Dutchess of Edinburg, intend to visit Ireland, this summer.

London, May 4.

Advices received at the Spanish Embassy here confirm the report of the entry of government troops into Bilboa, but the latest telegrams re-ceived from the north of Spain only state that Serrano entered Portuga-lette Friday afternoon and immediately marched for Bilboa. The Carlists were concentrated between Portugalette and Bilboa, and a des perate battle began at five o'clock Saturday morning, the result of which has not yet been reported. In the meantime the Carlist bat-teries turned their fire on Bilboa.

London, May 4. A special dispatch from San Ander to the Times says a deputation of volunteers from Bilboa visited General Mannel Delaconcha, who has been operating in the rear of Insurgents and informed him that the Carlists had returned to Concha. He immediately communicated the He immediately communicated the intelligence to Marshal Surrana and the latter replied by telegraph, granting to Concha the honor of first entering Bilboa.
