HOUSE.

The bill authorizing the first national bank of Seneca, Illinois, to change its name to the first national bank of Seneca, Illinois, was passed.

The bill amendatory to the charter of the Freedmen's Saving and Trust Company was passed.

The House then went into committee of the whole on the deficiency bill.

NEW YORK, May 14.

WASHINGTON, May 14.

MEMPHIS, May 14.

The southern inundation bids fair to become as disastrous in the State of Mississippi as it already is in Louisiana and southern Arkansas, where the greater portion of the country is under water. CHICAGO, May 14.

A special says two members of the Yellowstone expedition have returned to Bozeman, Montana, and report that the whole party returned to the vicinity of Tongue river. From the first to the twenty-sixth of April the force was harassed by Indians. Four pitched battles were fought, and one hundred Indians were killed.

Skirmishing was continued by bands of from 1 to 100, Indians, who were hovering around the whole outfit.

PORTLAND, May 14.

The Maine Republican State Central Committee was organized here last night. Speaker Blaine was re-elected chairman. W. S. Fuller will act as chairman during Blaine's absence. It was decided that the State Convention should be held at Augusta on the 18th of June.

NEW YORK, May 14.

A cable dispatch from Hong Kong says that the steamship Green Republic arrived from San Francisco on schedule time. She will be due at Yokohama on the 20th of May on her return trip, sailing at San Francisco about June 15th.

The American Bible Society held its 58th annual meeting at the Bible House to-day. President Wm. H. Allen, D. D., in the chair.

The business meeting commenced immediately after the devotional exercises in the morning. Managers for the next four years were elected. The annual report was presented, containing a synopsis of the work done and money received and expended during the year. It appears that the amount received from all sources was \$664,438; expended, \$611,738.73; grantees work for 1973, \$40,500. Of this \$24,405.53 was the cost of expedition to foreign fields. Appropriations for foreign lands for the ensuing year, \$92,071.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.

Tiberio Vasquez, the bandit for a long time the terror to the southern portion of the State, was captured with two of his gang this afternoon near Los Angeles.

A dispatch from Los Angeles says that deputy sheriff Johnson, of Los Angeles, captured the notorious captors of the notorious Vasquez. They found him at the house of Greek George, in Cayhengo Canyon. Vasquez was in bed unharmed. He jumped from a window, when they fired on him, and hit him three times. One shot from a rifle passed through his back. At five o'clock Vasquez was lodged in jail. The wounds are not dangerous. The jail is guarded by policemen. No access to the prisoner is allowed.

MADRID, May 14.

The cabinet has been reconstructed, and a new ministry announced to-day. Conservatives are largely in the majority. It is constituted as follows: Seana, President of the Council and Minister of War; Sarrata, Minister of the Interior; Ulloa, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Sancho, Minister of Finance; Alonzo Martinez, Minister of Justice; Alonzo Colmenarez, Minister of Public Works; Romero Orta, Minister of Colonies; Roeriguis, Associate Minister of Marine.

HAVANA, May 14.

The steamship Quimo was lost on Malinco Reef while carrying provisions to the Spanish troops. The crew were saved.

J. H. Gentry to-day publishes a decree prohibiting white or colored persons subject to military duty from changing their place of residence or receiving passport, unless they deposit \$200 in the treasury. The provisions of the decree heretofore issued exempting from duty in the bill all white members of the militia who pay \$500 in gold or \$1000 in paper has been extended to the colored militia. This amount can be paid into the treasury either before or after the parties are drafted. All men in the militia and those over thirty-five years, unless poor, are ordered to pay monthly contributions of two to eight dollars, according to the position of the individual.

MADRID, May 13.

A letter published to-day gives the text of a letter written by Gen. Burrell to Deauxmonde, explaining the Santiago massacre. He denies that the court martial was established on board the steamer Toronado to try prisoners, and says there were one hundred and fifty prisoners, the most of whom were tried by a military tribunal; five were sentenced to death, and three were liberated.

This he can prove by official documents; also that the Virginus was clearly proved a pirate legally captured, and unduly carrying the American flag. Of the remaining prisoners sixteen were sentenced to death and executed while 87 remained at the Captain General's disposal. On the 8th of November the war steamer Baraine to the Captain General in order that he might, if he wished, commute the death penalties of those not executed, as ordered by the court martial, and been received from Madrid.
