WASHINGTON, May 20. Mr. Scott, from the claims committee, reported adversely to a bill to provide for the settlement of the claims of loyal persons against the United States accruing during the rebellion. This bill was introduced by Mr. West to confer jurisdiction the court of claims to determine the claims of all citizens who remained loyal, and proposes aboli-tion to the board of southern claims.

Mr. Wright, from the commit-tee on conference, on the bill to facilitate the expertation of distilled spirits and amendatory acts relating thereto, reported a substitute which was laid over till to-morrow. The bill enabling the secretary of the interior to make a final settle-

ment with the Pottawattamie Indians in Michigan and Indiana was Mr. Frelinghuysen moved to take up the civil rights bill. Objections was made that a number of senators were necessarily absent who desired to speak upon it. Upon a division, a majority decided to take up the bill. Mr. Salisbury decided


