I That any druggist doing business as such in the City of Omaha, may, upon written application, obtain a license to sell malt, spirituous and vinous liquors, for medicinal, mechapical and domestic uses only, to be used away from the premises where sold, upon complying with the requirements of sect on \$. of chapter XXI, of the revised ordinances of the City of Omaha, and by paying therefor at the rate of \$30 per annum. Such licers s not to be issued for a less period than six months. And Provided for a less period than six months. And Provided for a less period than six months. And the bond mentioned in section 2, of said chapter XXI, of the revised Crdinances, shall be further conditioned that the said druggist will noted or permit tobe sold, barteredor given awayany such spirituous, vinous or malt liquors awayany such spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or any composition of which such liquors form a part, except for the express purpose above set forth to wit: For medicinal, mechanical and lomestic uses.
