To contest such, lists and papers may be produced on paper of subpona, and shall be carefully examined. Any custodian refusing to keep such papers, or to produce them when called for, shall be liable to a fine of \$1,000 at suit of the party asking for the production of the papers. All the votes shall be counted at the close of the day of election, and if the officers and managers decline to make such count they shall be liable to fine and imprisonment. One section prohibits the sale or gift of the various malt or spiritous liquors to any voter at an election for representative or delegate in Congress and any person violating the pro-visions of this section shall be liable to punishment of a fine not less than two nor more than five hun-dred dollars, and imprisonment of not less than six months nor more than two years.
