**There** are quacks in the newspaper business just as there are quacks in medicine. The *Buchu* journalist is usually gifted with a faculty that ordinary people pronounce "brass," but which is often made to supply the want of journalistic ability or genuine enterprise. There are numerous *Buchu* Journals within the wide range of our newspaper acquaintance, but the *Omaha Herald* is pre-eminently entitled to occupy the most conspicuous place among them. For innate systematic egotism, self-puffery and unblinking cheek, it certainly has no equal on the western continent.

**A** sample of genuine *buchu* journalism we refer to readers to the following article that appears in the editorial columns of the *Herald* of this date:

**The** *Herald's* Rochefort Article.—The article on Rochefort, from the accomplished pen of Mr. Homer Bull, received the highest praise from all who were qualified to judge it upon its merits. It naturally provoked the jealousy of "the little creatures whom God," etc. In justice to the city editor of the *Herald*, we print the following mention of that admirable production in a private letter received yesterday from Mr. J. Sterling Morton, which shows what a man of brains and character thinks of Mr. Bull's article.

**"Stull's** Rochefort article was splendidly accomplished. He never did so exceedingly good a thing before, and he always does what an educated gentleman should do."

**The** editor of the *Bee* was personally present during the brief interview between Messrs Stull and Rochefort. That interview was chiefly notable for a mutual exchange of snide courtesies. If Mr. Morton had been aware of the fact that the

**substance** of the pretended talk between Rochefort and the *Herald* reporter was courteously communicated to Stull by the *Bee* editor he would not have sung Homer's praises so profusely. Nor would the little creature whom an inscrutable Providence seems to have created for the purpose of building up a live newspaper in Omaha, have criticised the *Herald's* report, had it not displayed such profuse and inexcusable cheek in trying to palm an imaginary interview upon its readers.

**In** this connection we may well state that our interview with Rochefort as published in Thursday's *Bee* is acknowledged every day by Chicago journalists to be the more interesting and complete than any that has yet been published. The best evidence of this is the fact that it was transmitted to the Chicago *Post* by telegraph.

**That** journal declares editorially "that it is the fullest and most authentic narrative of Rochefort's movements and opinions that has been given since he landed in America." It was also evidently the opinion of the Chicago Associated Press agent who telegraphed the *Bee's* report to the Eastern press. This illustrates as much as anything the difference between any genuine journalistic tact and *buchu* journalism.

In the Roman Catholic Cathedral at Baltimore there are said to be richer treasures than in any other church in the world. Jeweled alabaster and silver chalices—gold and silver vessels—ornaments, elaborate chasubles, mitres, copes, dalmatices, rochetes, stoles, maniples, benediction veils, and other ecclesiastical vestments are all carefully preserved in its tabernacles and sacristies. Some of the ornaments are relics of the past. Among others, the gilded crozier (episcopal crook) used by Archbishop Carroll, eighty-five years ago, occupies a conspicuous place, as also the rich mitre worn by himself and departed successors on the days of their enthronement. Even the cathedral vaults are shrines of treasures, as besides the silver and gold vessels, and the remains of archbishops, there are archiepiscopal rings worn by each during his government of the diocese.

**EDUCATIONAL NOTES.**
