A Prosperous and Progressive

(Correspondence of the BEE.) WILBER, June 4th, '74. EDITOR BEE: Among the most enterprising

towns in Nebraska, which is particularly noted for its rapid growth, is Wilber, Saline county, on the B. & M. line of railroad in Nebraska. The town is located in that superb valley of Blue river, 30 miles southwest of the capital. Its citizens are alive to their interest, and welcome all who are in search for a good business moiety, and are will-ing to lend a helping hand to those who are willing to help themselves.

The town is now about one year old; the depot was built, 24x50 during the summer, after which the town made its commencement, and grew rapidly until the close of the As soon as spring opened the

town started out with renewed vigor, and has during the past thirty days made that progress that would surprise the most romantic mind. The town was named after C. D. Wilber, of Aurora, Illinois, and the owner of the town site, he is the olliest of the age, who has steered his barge through the valley of adversity, and has made a handsome fortune by his indomitable

energy and good management. The town is one of the most sitely in the west, being located on the west side of Blue river, on a high bottom with a gradual inclined plain rising to the northwest, and opening out in the valley southeast one of the most beautiful lawns on the globe, which will attract the attention of lovers of scenery and

The town occupies about three hundred acres, which has a good class of dwellings and business houses, and a good hotel. Rev. Fred Alley, pastor of the Congregotional church has been actively engaged in the the erection of their church, which is about completed, the building is 24x40 feet, 18 feet story, plain gothic style with steeple, and represents a mechanical skill highly credible to its builder.

will erect the finest brick block in the town this season. The town and its interests are backed by good, ubstantial men, who are financially able to keep it moving rapidly.
