4 O'CLOCK P. M. TORONTO, May 18. The small pox has broken out in the lunatic asylum here, which still continues. There are six hundred patients and four deaths have already occurred.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 15.

The black stallion Strideaway, the famous trotter, owned by Keeler, Wright & Sumway, and valued at \$25,000, died of disease at their stable, in this city yesterday.

LITTLE ROCK, June 16.

The Bricklayers' Union did not meet last night. Intended Michael Bowler, a non-union plasterer, reading on east Fifty-ninth street, was attacked and dangerously injured by three men, because he would not quit work.

COLUMBUS, O., June 16.

Reports from Nelsonville to-day state that everything is quiet there. One hundred colored miners have done effective work in the mines to-day and got out the first coal that has been moved since the strike commenced. No union miners have been in the vicinity of the works to-day. Guards are still kept on duty, and an increased force of miners will be at work to-morrow.
