Congressional SENATE. WASHINGTON, June 17. The bill to ascertain the possessing rights of the Hudson Bay Company, and other British subjects, was passed.

At the expiration of the morning hour, the postoffice appropriation bill came up as unfinished business, being on the calendar. The majority Secretary (V.) to the amendment of Mr. Frelinghuysen, providing that the amendment shall apply only to documents ordered printed by either branch of Congress, from the passage of the act. Mr. Frelinghuysen accepted, and his amendment thus modified adopted.

At the meeting of the directors of the Union Pacific railroad in Boston to-day the question of establishing rolling mills for the manufacture of the company's rails will be considered.

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Mr. Tremaine presented a minority report, signed by himself and Messrs. Frye, Cessna, and Ward, (Ill.) dissenting from the minority report, and recommending the dismissal of all proceedings against Durell.

All reports were ordered to be printed, and the House took a recess till evening. The evening session was devoted to business from the naval committee, of little general interest. Adjourned.

WASHINGTON, June 17. The Senate finance committee to-day agreed to strike out of the House tariff bill the proposition to refund to manufacturers the tax on liquor used in manufacturing tobacco.

The Senate has confirmed the nomination of Robert M. Reynolds, Minister to Bolivia; John L. Cadwalader, Vice Assistant Secretary of State; John L. Long, Surveyor of Customs, St. Louis; Geo. S. McCarty, receiver of public monies, Norfolk, Neb.; A. Pollock, postmaster, Brownsville, Tex.

The President has approved the joint resolution providing for the termination of the treaty between the United States and the King of Belgium.

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TELEGRAPHIC. 4 O'CLOCK P. M. WASHINGTON, June 17. There are a number of very important bills on the Speaker's table in the House. The civil rights bill blocks the way. The conference committee on the currency bill had two sessions yesterday, and the members express confidence that they will be able to agree upon the bill.

It is thought that one feature of the bill will be the redistribution, perhaps to the extent of \$50,000,000, of the present national bank circulation.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17. In a shooting affray last evening between Charles DeYoung, of the Chronicle, and Nightly of the Evening Sun, several shots were exchanged, but neither party hurt.

A small boy received a shot in the ankle, causing a slight wound. The difficulty arose from the publication in yesterday's Sun of an article about DeYoung's mother. Both were put under \$1,500 bonds.

CINCINNATI, June 17. A special to the Enquirer from Lawrenceburg, Ind., gives the details of one of the most horrible murders on record. The family of Wm. T. Bradley, a poor man, now working in Chili, were found dead.

The mother with her bowels ripped open, and the two children, aged seven and nine, besides like mother beyond recognition. No cause is assigned or conjectured, unless that of outraging the woman and murdering her.

NEW YORK, June 17. The bricklayers strike continues. At a meeting of the employing masters last evening they adopted resolutions to pay \$25 per day for eight hours labor, or \$4 for ten hours labor.

In several instances the employers have conceded to the demands of the men, but in the majority of cases non-union hands have been employed.

The firm of Turner Bros., bankers, No. 14 Nassau street, have suspended. It is thought that the cause of their suspension was an advance of money to the Western Railroad Company on inadequate securities.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 17. The prospect is that the Illinois Republican State Convention to-day will endorse the inflation policy, will reiterate the financial policy of the last Republican National Convention which would be a good and wise thing to do. It reads as follows:

Resolved, That we denounce the repudiation of the public debt in any form or disguise, as a national crime; and that we witness with pride the reduction of the principal of the national debt, and of the rates of interest on the balance, and confidently expect that our excellent national currency will be perfected by a speedy resumption of specie payment.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 17. In the twelfth ballot for U. S. Senator to-day, in the General Assembly, in joint session, Burnside received 43, Dixon 29, Barlow 17, scattering 20—total vote 107; necessary to a choice 54.

THIRTEENTH BALLOT: Burnside, 45; Dixon, 28; Barlow, 16; scattering, 21. After taking the second ballot the convention adjourned until to-morrow.

LONDON, June 17. The Assent races commenced Tuesday. The Scott stakes, the Prince of Wales stakes, and the Assent gold wags. The first was won by Lord Londale's Crowsy, the second by Sir R. Bulkeley's Solus, and the third by John Osborne's Organist.

LISBON, June 17. The steamer Africa has returned to this port after successfully laying her section of the Brazilian cable. The line has been tested and found to work satisfactorily, and turned over to the Brazilian cable company. Unbroken telegraphic communication is established between England and Cape Horn.

LONDON, June 17. A Times Paris dispatch reports that supplementary steps for an alliance of centres have been taken. In the Journal Desseins, an article of the Left Centre, comparing the fears aroused by the empire with confidence inspired by the Republic. It true the conservatives will hardly consent to assume the government.

THE report that Due de Bisaccia had resigned is confirmed.

HAVANA, June 17. The Diario says that four armed insurgents, who belonged to the bands of Canaguaguai, have come into the Spanish lines at Trocha Suleira and surrendered themselves.

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
