The days of the Forty-third Congress are numbered. Tomorrow afternoon will witness the desertion of the "Wind Cave."

The civil rights bill has been unable to keep its head above water, and has met a similar fate. A currency bill has finally passed.

The hand tax bill, which promised such good results to the depleted exchequer of the State, in compelling the payment of delinquent taxes from the railroads, and which passed the House by the personal and untiring effort of Judge Crouse, has virtually been defeated in the Senate.

A Senate bill has been reported by the committee in place of the House bill which abolishes the U. P. and Central Pacific, and their branches, from, and obligations already incurred by the company, and to the West additional banking privileges to the extent of some \$50,000,000.
