## SHOOTING AFFRAY.

A Telegraph Operator Fatally Shot by a Saloon Keeper.

A Lively Duel Setween the two Men.

From a telegram received in this city yesterday we learn the particulars of a probable fatal shooting affray which occurred at Julesburg, on the Union Pacific railroad Tuesday, between W. A. Safford, operator at the station, and C. C. Clifton, a keeper of a low groggery. It appears that a few days ago Clifton accused Safford of taking LADIES,' his pocket knife, and threatened to shoot him, pulling a revolver on him, but without shooting.

Tuesday afternoon Safford went over to Clifton's saloon to "make up" with him, but failing to do so, high words ensued between the two men, when Safford pulled his revolver, knowing that Clifton had one, and that he had threatened to shoot him.

Clifton jerked out his revolver, and without a moment's hesitatook effect in Safford's breast. A lively exchange of shots followed, but the first was the only one that hit the mark.

Safford was taken to Sidney on the east-bound train, and there received medical attendance. The wound is pronounced fatal, and Safford is now lying at the point of

Clifton retreated to his house, and when the citizens attempted to take him, he kept blazing away at them, taking care not no hit any one. He thus kept them at bay till late at night, when M. F. Leach, the station agent, had the courage to capture him single-handed, and take him, Wednesday morning, to Sidney, where he is now locked up.
