CHICAGO. THE GARDEN CITY IN FLAMES! Another Disaster Fire. Fall Particulars of the Great Conflagration.

CHICAGO, June 15. The fire commenced in that portion of the city, known as Cheyenne, on Taylor, between Twelfth and Clark streets, and Fourth avenue. This part of the city consists of the worst rookeries imaginable, most of which were occupied as houses of ill-fame.

At about half past 6 o'clock the fire crossed the corner of Taylor and Third streets, communicating to Queens Chapel (colored) on the east side of that street. The spread of the flames southward on Clark was checked at 6:57, although the buildings from No. 527 to 537 were badly damaged.

MIDNIGHT.

A Second Fire Breaks Out in Chicago and Some Twenty Buildings Are Burned.

CHICAGO, July 15. Another fire broke out about 4:30 o'clock this afternoon in the northwest part of the city, in the vicinity of Milwaukee and Chicago streets, between Taylor and Franklin.
