Red Cloud, Nebr., Feb. 2, 1914. Board met in regular session. Members present—Storey, Turnure, Gilliam, Coon, Creighton and Blackledge.

Minutes of previous meetings read and approved. Secretary reported \$1440.70 cash on hand and all out standing warrants paid.

Tuition claims for the first semester ending Jan. 15, 1914 amounting to \$987 have been filed for collection.

Upon motion spring vacation was ordered to begin March 30th, and end April 4th.

Moved and seconded that a fee of \$1 be charged for all special examinations not provided for by the rules of the school board.

Upon motion John Wolfe was allowed \$10 additional pay per month as assistant in wood shop.

Upon motion Secretary was instructed to accept invitation of the Fairbury School Board to help them in organizing a state school-board association.

Mrs. Lois McKeighan Is Laid To Rest

The angel of death, who has been so busy among us lately, has again visited us, and removed from our midst one of the best known and best loved of our people. Mrs. Lois Ellen Brown McKeighan was born in Fulton county, Illinois, November 2, 1848. She was married October 24, 1865, to Honorable William A. McKeighan. Six children were born to them, three of whom are living, the eldest and the two younger having passed to their reward. Mr. and Mrs. McKeighan came to Red Cloud in the year 1880 and settled on a farm near the city. Mr. McKeighan, after serving his country faithfully in the Civil war and in the halls of congress, passed away December 15, 1895. Mrs. McKeighan departed from her loved ones at 2 o'clock Friday, morning, January 30, 1914. The funeral took place from the house at 3 o'clock on February 1st and was very largely attended. Rev. John J. Bayne, Mrs. McKeighan's pastor, officiated.

She was the kindest of mothers and always cheerful and hopeful. Her faith in God was strong and deep and found expression in a beautiful Christian life. She was a faithful member of the Congregational church and was always interested in its work even when she was unable to attend. She will be greatly missed not only by those dearest to her but by the entire community. We can truly say of her, "Blessed are they that die in the Lord from henceforth, yea, saith the Spirit, for they rest from their labors, but their works do follow them."

The City Council met on Tuesday night with Mayor Saunders and Councilmen Foe, Crans, Storey and Cowden present.

City Clerk was ordered to certify to county clerk, the amount of cost of cement furnished in C. F. Evans' walk.

Moved by Cowden, seconded by Foe that "wet and dry question" be submitted to the voters at city election. Carried.

Dormant Spray Recommended

A spray for dormant trees to prevent the spread of fungus diseases and orchard insects is being recommended by the horticultural department of the University of Nebraska. The spray consists of one gallon of lime sulphur to ten gallons of water. It is especially intended to control the spread of the Blister canker and Apple aphid arising through the infections of pruning and other tree wounds. Fair dry weather is advised when the application is being made.
