

A spray for dormant trees to prevente the spread of fungus diseases and orchard insects is being recommended by the horticultural department of the University of Nebraska. The spray consists of one gallen of lime sulphur to ten gallons of water. It is especially intended to control the spread of the Blister canker and Apple aphis Lowest rates, best option.
