The bank failures at Superior and Sutton, this state, and the recent failure of the Memphis, Tenn., bank, in which the president plead guilty to

The developments in the grand jury investigation of the Sutton bank are daily becoming more sensational, as, for instance witness the indictment of Thomas Matters the former well known Harvard attorney who the indictment charges with being implicated with President Luebben in the wrecking of the institution. No doubt the capture and return of Felt, the runaway cashier of the Superior bank, will result in full publicity as to just what the bank examiners have found and these findings may be more sensational than anticipated. These bank cases and all similar ones go to prove that the stockholders and directors of a bank have every cause to be watchful over the management of the financial institution in which they have staked their capital and reputation.

Johns, secretary of the State Press Association in operating with the newspapers in the upbuilding of the Great State of Nebraska."
