District Court Proceedings

District Court opened Monday morning, the 16th, for a two weeks jury term, with Judge H. S. Dungan on the bench.

The following cases have been disposed of at this time:

State v Chas. Lindley, Illegal Sale of Intoxicating Liquors, continued, on defendant giving bond for \$500.00.

State v Milo Williams, Forgery, Defendant having served five months in the county jail, and the charge being on a \$10 check, complaint is changed to attempt to obtain money under false pretenses, and defendant is sentenced to one day in county jail, to pay the costs, and make restitution of \$10 to the party, J. A. Denton.

State v Amos Dillon, charged with assault with intent to kill; found guilty by the jury and clemency recommended, the penalty being 1 to 20 years in the penitentiary.

State v Steve Bruce, Assault, continued, bond \$200.00.

Rosa Jones v Geo. Francis et al. Demurrer overruled, plaintiff given 20 days to answer.

Nebraska Electric Co., v City of Red Cloud, suit was for \$203.63, and interest at 7 percent from May 1, 1907, amounting to \$434.93; the city had offered judgment for \$150.00 with interest amounting to \$220.00. Verdict was for plaintiff for \$500.

Nebraska Telephone Co., v City of Red Cloud, suit was for \$404.60 and interest from April 19, 1907, amounting to \$600.84; the city had offered judgment for \$210.00, with interest, amounting to \$12.90. Verdict was for plaintiff for \$382.00.

Henry Cook v National Fidelity & Casualty Co., continued for term by consent.

Orra Wilson v Thos. Wilson, Decree of divorce for plaintiff as prayed for.

Susan B. Clapp et al v Jacob L. Miller et al, Decree quieting title as prayed for by plaintiffs.

N. M. Doudna v Mary E. Maloney et al, sale confirmed. Deed ordered.

Women's Short Course Offered

A women's short course in domestic science lasting four days may be obtained by the women of any community upon application to the Extension Service, University Farm, Lincoln. Two instructors are sent free of charge to give lectures and demonstrations. Actual cooking is done and a thorough study is made as to the economic value of foods, their digestibility, and nutritive value. A neat cutting demonstration is given at which a beef carcass is cut up and the various cuts explained. Home nursing, invalid cookery, breads, salads, and desserts are also treated.

C. B. Hale Faces Serious Charges

On complaint of several Indianola people Mr. C. B. Hale of the Reporter was placed in the hands of Sheriff Fitch, yesterday, altho no formal complaint has as yet been made against Mr. Hale.

There are several matters involved in the present difficulty of Mr. Hale, alleged mortgaging of property to which he did not have title; the matter of alleged board bill due.

It is stated the formal complaint will be made yet today.

The Tribune hopes Mr. Hale may be able to clear himself of any attempt at wrong doing.—Monday's McCook Tribune.

Mr. Hale of Red Cloud, who recently took charge of the Indianola Reporter, is being held in this city to answer several charges from citizens of Indianola, who claim that Mr. Hale has not treated them squarely.

Capt. Adams Wounded By Masked Highwaymen

Intense excitement followed the attempt Wednesday night at Superior to kill Capt. C. E. Adams, the well known banker of that city says The Hastings Daily Republican. Capt. Adams was passing an alley near Seventh and Central streets on his way home from the business center of the town. Two men, one disguised with a white mask over his face rushed upon him. The Captain grappled with his assailants at the same time pulling a revolver. The two men began shooting at the Captain at close range and the Captain was likewise quick in using his revolver. He put up such a game fight that the two men beat a hasty retreat. Two bullets struck Mr. Adams behind the ear, striking so near each other that it was hard to determine whether the wound was the mark of one or two bullets.

Physicians were quickly summoned. The fact that a revolver carried by one of the assailants and a white mask were found in the alley close to the scene of the encounter is taken as conclusive evidence that Mr. Adams seriously wounded one of the men for there were blood stains on the mask. There were three empty shells in Capt. Adams' revolver and two in the other revolver, showing five or more shots to have been fired during the pistol duel.
