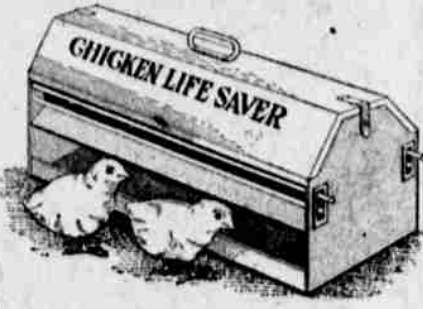

WOULD BE OF GREAT VALUE

Idea for a Laboratory of Safety Devices Has Been Put Forward by Employers of Labor.

Why not have a laboratory of safety devices is the question asked by many manufacturers who have been giving honest attention to the subject of preserving the health and physical well-being of their employes. With the many safety devices already offered, the average manufacturer is somewhat in the dark as to the appliances which best could benefit his business.

With this idea in view, it is proposed that a staff of competent engineers be appointed whose sole duty it shall be to test the numerous appliances offered and decide whether they are fitted to the various industries they represent. The prevention naturally would prove one of the biggest subjects to be taken under consideration. Many inventions have to do with hoes, doors, shutters, etc., and under present conditions the only way for a factory owner to determine their value is to put them to a test—those tests oftentimes being made under conditions where a great loss in human life results.
