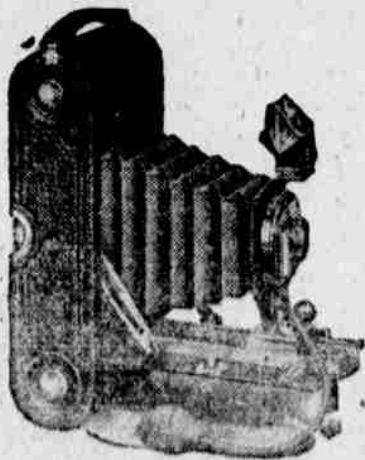

Good Flowers To Grow

Nebraska furnishes the flower lover a wide choice of varieties even in the districts most affected by drought. The North Platte Experimental Substation of the Nebraska College of Agriculture suggests the following uninclusive list of shrubs and ornamentals, if given sufficient water. Shrubs that have given good results at the Substation are tamarisk, spiraea Van Houttei, the several kinds of honeysuckles and snow balls, lilacs, mock orange, golden elder, cut leaf sumac, flowering almond, Siberian pea tree, the native flowering currant, and Thunberg barberry. Other plants that have proved successful are the pansy, tulip, peony, dahlia, phlox, and gladiolus. More information concerning the growth of flowers, as well as trees, may be secured upon application for bulletin No. 137 of the Bulletin department, University Farm, Lincoln.
