He is one of the stouthearted, regged made, game race horses, and is from a race horse family on both sides of the house, being sired by altercyone, he by the great Alierton 200 1-4, his dam being the great brood mare, All McGregor, by Ben McGregor. His second dam is Mand McGregor, dam of Nut McGregor, 217 3-4, also the dam of Miss Deimarch, the greatest race mare that ever raced over a haif mile track. Also the dam of many others with standard records. His third dam is the dam of six from 211 to 2:23 1-4, and with the fourth dam is a eroducar on his sire's side. Alierton family, being by Aliercyone the best son of the great Allerton, who in his time held the world's, and was the leading sire of the world; on his great Allerton, who in his time heid the world's dam' side the first three dams were McGregor man's, which family gave us the mighty creeus, who held the staliton record, 202 14, for several years, and a family that has been considered the gamest race ho se family in existence. Allorcyone McGregor is a fine individual and a game race horse, having started 21 times and being first or second every time but twice. He was bred by F. Kneil, Carthage, Mo. In a race at Toledo, Ohlo, Sept. 14, 1910, he beat as high class a field of 212 pacers as ever started over a half mile track, the first heat being 200 14, equaling the track record made by Mattie Chimes the year before. He won the heat pulled to a jog in the stretch, and it was said by all the horsemen present that he could have paced the heat in 258 or better. His record is no limit to his speed, as he has be a paced a half mile on a balf mile track in 102 14. a quarter in 29, and an eighth in 33 14. While Aliercyone McGregor is a pacer himself, he is strictly trotting breed, and what few coits he has are all troters, and show lots of speed, and he should be as great a streas his grandsire if given an opportunity.
