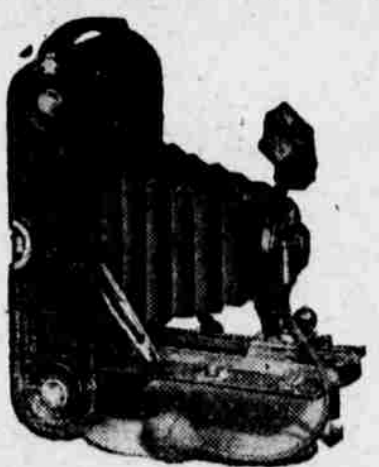

## E. G. Caldwell Files For County Attorney

We call the attention of our readers to the announcement of E. G. Caldwell for County Attorney in this week's issue.

He came to Red Cloud the latter part of 1909, since which time he has been associated with L. H. Blackledge in the practice of law. He graduated from the Kansas City School of Law in June 1908, and was Assistant to the County Attorney of Seward County, Kansas from September 1908 to September 1909. The laws of Nebraska do not admit the attorneys of Missouri or Kansas unless they have practiced five years; so Mr. Caldwell took the state Bar Examination at Lincoln and was admitted before the Supreme Court in November 1910. He has been Deputy County Attorney under Fred Maurer for the past four years.

In September 1911 he married one of Red Cloud's girls, bought a residence and has made Red Cloud his permanent home. We feel safe in saying that with these qualifications Mr. Caldwell is competent, and that he has had the experience necessary to make a good County Attorney. If elected, he will doubtless do his duty without fear or favor.

## Council Proceedings

Red Cloud, May 5, 1914

The city council met last night in their first regular meeting for the new year, in the council chamber, with His Honor, Mayor Damerell presiding, and Aldermen Foe, Perry, Storey and Caldwell, present. O. C. Teel, city clerk at the desk. The following business was transacted:

Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

Application of A. C. Slaby for city marshal was presented and read.

Moved by Storey and seconded by Perry that the following appointments be confirmed. Carried.

President of Council—S. W. Foe.  
City Attorney—Frank Munday.  
Health Physician—Dr. H. Cook.  
City Marshal—Grant Christy.

Street commissioner—To be filled by mayor and street and alley committee later.

Supt. water and lights—Gay Zeigler.  
Finance committee—Perry, Caldwell and Foe.

Supply committee—Storey, Perry and Caldwell.

Building committee—Caldwell, Storey and Foe.

Side and cross walk committee—Foe, Perry and Storey.

Streets and alleys, 1st ward—Foe and Perry.

Streets and alleys, 2nd ward—Caldwell and Storey.

Advisory committee—Robert Damerell, chairman; S. W. Foe, Frank Perry, Paul Storey and J. O. Caldwell.

Moved by Storey and seconded by Foe that O. C. Teel be appointed book keeper at \$25 per month. Carried.

Labor and expense items under \$3 be paid by clerk and placed in expense account. Carried.

Moved by Storey and seconded by Foe that the city will not be liable for any debt when not accompanied by the required requisition. Carried.

Moved by Foe and seconded by Caldwell that chairman of supply committee O. K. all freight and expense bills on city treasurer. Carried.

Estimate by city engineer on dirt in telephone excavation read and filed.

Annual report of S. R. Florance and April report read and ordered placed on file.

Report of school district 2 on cost of water main read. Total cost \$76.65.

City clerk's annual report read.

Mayor made a few statements regarding superintendent and engineers at the power house. Moved by Foe and seconded by Storey that salary of each of the engineers be increased \$5.00 per month from May 1st, 1914. Yeas, Foe, Perry, Storey, Caldwell not voting.

Moved by Storey and seconded by Perry that Superintendent Zeigler's salary be increased \$20 per month, with understanding that he remain with city to May 1st, 1915. Carried.

Bid on coal by Carbon Coal Supply Company read, and their representative, Mr. Jones, being present explained the proposition. Moved by Foe and seconded by Storey that the supply committee together with mayor and superintendent be instructed to look the matter up. Carried.

Petition of the M. E. Sunday school for stand on school house grounds during hand concerts, read. Moved by Perry and seconded by Storey that the request be rejected, on account of it being unfair to subscribers to the band fund. Carried.

Henry Dedrick asked for siren whistle at the power house to be used in case of fire. Moved by Storey and seconded by Perry that fire commissioner and superintendent Zeigler be instructed to look up price and report. Carried.

Moved that E. H. Weber's coal hauling proposition at 50c a ton and he stand demurrage under three cars at one time, be accepted. Carried.

Moved by Perry, seconded by Foe that rubbish in Locust street be referred to street and alley committee of the 2nd ward.
