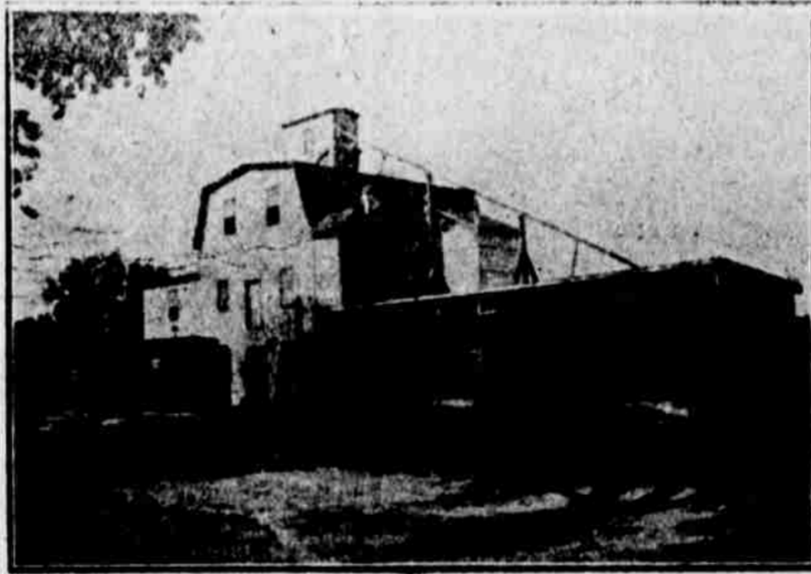

The Amboy Mill is Destroyed by Fire

Lightning Strikes Cupolo Of Mill Sunday Evening, And It Burns to the Ground. Loss \$25,000



On Sunday night about 10 o'clock the Amboy Flouring Mill was struck by lightning and burned to the ground. Starke Bros saw the bolt strike the cupolo and immediately ran over to the Frisbie homes and notified them. By the time they reached the mill it was all afire and consequently nothing was saved. The mill had a capacity of 150 barrels per day and was one of the best in the state. It was built in 1885 and Elm creek furnished the water power by which it was operated.

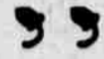

E. M. Beal of Superior was in town Saturday.

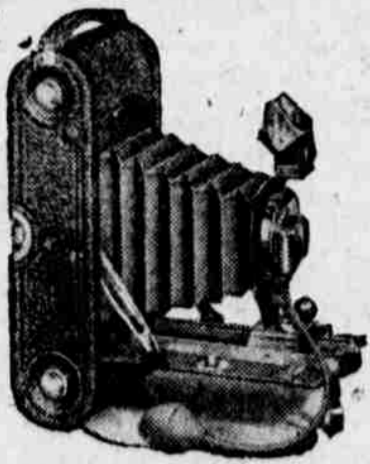
D. M. Able was in Lincoln the last of the week.
