1915 Nebraska Boy's Pig Club

Who May Enter The Pig Club. Any boy in Nebraska between the ages of 10 and 18 may enter the pig club. There is no entry fee nor will there be any expense except that of raising and exhibiting a pig. Each member must agree to raise at least one pig and to keep records of feed, weight, gains, etc., according to instructions sent him by the State Leader.

It is desirable that those who can do so raise a whole litter of pigs. They can then pick out the best pig to exhibit for prizes. If only one pig is secured it should be a sow so that the boy may be in a position to raise a litter of pigs the second year. It is further hoped that each boy may have the benefit of all the profit on the pig or pigs he raises.

When the pig is entered in the contest it must be accurately described as to age, breed, color, markings, etc. Either a grade or a pure bred pig may be used, but it is urged that pure bred animals be secured whenever possible. Entering the pig club does not deprive a boy of the right to membership in the corn club or any other club.

HOW TO ENTER PIG CLUB AND CONTESTS

Local Clubs. It is desired to emphasize the local club organizations as much as possible. A local club will consist of at least six boys each of whom will agree to raise and exhibit a pig. Such a club may be organized in a school district, a neighborhood, a township, or any other part of a county. Each local club must be in charge of an adult person such as a school teacher, minister, or other person interested in boys. Each club will be expected to meet at least once a month. As soon as the club is organized a list of members and names of officers must be sent to the State Agent in charge of Pig Clubs.

A contest will be arranged for each local club at which each boy must exhibit his pig. The pigs will be judged by a competent person and the awards made according to rule 8.

In case there are not enough boys to form a local club, each boy who wishes

to become a member must send his name and address to the State Agent in charge of Pig Clubs. He will then be sent the instructions, record blanks, and other material the same as if he was a member of a local club. He will also be eligible to the county contest and to all state prizes.

County Clubs. The next larger unit is the county club. This will include all local clubs in a county as well as any boys in the county who are not members of local clubs, but who have enrolled with the State Agent. The county club and contest will be in charge of the county farm demonstrator, the county superintendent of schools or other competent person appointed by the State Agent.

A county contest will be provided at which the winners in the local clubs and any other club members not in the local clubs, but in the county, may compete for prizes. This contest must be held during the month of November.

A WORD ABOUT PRIZES

The cash prizes will be well worth striving for. It is hoped, however, that no boy will go into these contests for the sole purpose of winning these prizes. The best prizes can be won by every boy in the club. One of these is the profit on the pig. If the pig is properly fed and handled every boy ought to clear a neat little sum. Another prize is the knowledge and experience to be gained by carefully raising a pig and keeping accurate records on it. Each boy will be conducting a little experiment station of his own. Bulletins and other information relating to hog raising will be sent to each club member monthly.

RULES FOR THE NEBRASKA PIG CLUB

- 1. Membership is limited to boys and girls who are not less than ten years old nor more than eighteen on July 1, 1915.
- 2. Each member must secure at least one pig to feed and take care of.
- 3. Each member must feed and care for his pig or pigs in person and must keep a record of the feed given and the pasture grazed. He must record the weight of the pig when he begins to feed it and at stated intervals so as to determine the gains. The date the pig was farrowed should also be recorded.
- 4. Prizes will be established for all feeds at the office of the State Leader. The feeds used by all contestants will

Record blanks, which will be furnished, must be certified by two disinterested persons.

All members must be enrolled before July 1, 1915. They will begin to keep a record of their pigs as soon as they are weaned, which must be before July 1, 1915.

7. Each member must agree to study the instructions sent him by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Nebraska, and to send reports of the work done to the State Agent.

8. Where pigs are exhibited for prize the awards shall be made on the following basis:
(A) The best hog with respect

- (B) The greatest daily gains on the hog..... 15 percent
- (C) Cheapest cost of production..... 25 percent
- (D) Best kept records..... 20 percent
