Red Cloud High Wins Championship

In a fast and exciting game Friday, before a large crowd, the local high school team defeated the heavy eleven from Beaver City by a score of 19 to 6, thereby winning the championship of southwestern Nebraska. Though outweighed over five points to a man, the local team outplayed the Beavers thruout the entire game, the fast back field of the locals having little trouble in gaining ground against the heavy Beavers. Long end runs by Shuck and Giger were numerous and kept the crowd in an enthusiastic mood.

Features of the game was a 55 yard run by Polnick scoring Red Cloud's third touchdown. Beaver City's only score was protested by the locals on claim of Beaver City pushing their man over for touchdown, but score was allowed to stand.

Red Cloud scored in the first quarter, Polnick going over for first touch down. Red Cloud getting ball on their own 28 yard line, and a forward pass made 25 yards, another thru center added 10 yards more. An end run by Shuck of 22 yards, Blackledge adding 10 yards. Beaver City penalized 5 yards for offside, Polnick making last gain for a touchdown, also kicking goal. First quarter ended with ball in Red Cloud's possession on the Beaver's 20 yard line.

Second quarter opened with Giger making 12 yards on an end run and Polnick adding 6 yards on a line smash. Blackledge going over for second touchdown. Polnick kicking goal, score 13 to 0.

Again by long end runs by Shuck and Giger, and line smashes by Blackledge and Polnick, intermingled with forward passes, the locals marched the length of the field only to be held for downs on the one yard line, the Beavers taking the ball and kicking out of danger. The half ended with the ball in center of field in Beaver City possession.

Beaver City came back strong in the second half, but was unable to score only the protested touchdown in the first of the last quarter, failing to kick goal.

Beaver City kicked off to Red Cloud's 40 yard line and Wilson returned five yards. Giger went around the left end for 6 yards. Shuck added 4 more around right end. Polnick on a line buck thru tackle, broke thru the entire Beaver team for a fifty yard dash for a touchdown, falling to kick goal, score 19 to 6, game ending with the ball in Red Cloud's possession in the center of the field.

The playing of Shuck and Polnick were the main hold of the locals. The speed of our team, with their forward passes and long end runs, overwhelmed the husky Beavers, and only in the third quarter did they appear dangerous.
