Commissioners' Proceedings

Red Cloud, Neb., Dec. 8, 1914.

Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present: Storey, Hoffman, McColl, Constance and Chaplin, Chairman of said board.

R. D. Smith appeared representing a committee of citizens and asked permission to place a bronze tablet in the Court House in honor of G. W. Hammett. On motion permission was granted.

In the matter of the road petition of E. L. Jones and others asking for a public road commencing at a point where the county line of Webster and Franklin Counties intersect, with the half section line of Section 7, Town 1, Range 12, West, running south about 23 rods to foot of bluff, thence East along the foot of the bluff to a point 23 rods west of the Southeast corner of the Northeast Quarter of said Section, thence northwesterly to a point which is 13 rods north of the southeast corner of the Northeast quarter of Section 7 aforesaid and there terminating. Said proposed road to be 40 feet wide. On motion foregoing petition was granted and opened and established as prayed for in said petition.

Dr. Nicholson came before the Board and made statement that he was erroneously assessed on personal property in the sum of \$1800 actual value and asked that board have the taxes on the assessment of same struck from the tax books for 1914. On motion the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and ordered to strike the tax on assessed value of \$1800 from the tax list of 1914.

On motion the old court house was sold to School District No. 2 of Red Cloud City and Precinct, for the sum of \$450 being the highest bid for said building.

In the matter of choosing Janitor for new court house. O. J. Kaley was hired for janitor for one year at a salary of \$49.50 per month per his bid now on file with County Clerk. Contract between Kaley and the county board will be drawn up later.

It was moved and seconded that the County Board put in the Farmers Independent system of service consisting of 7 phones, under ground service in the new court house at Red Cloud, Nebraska.

In the matter of the road petition of Frederick Farmer now coming on for hearing. It was moved and seconded that said hearing be and hereby is postponed to the regular meeting in January, 1915. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the board buy 4 additional telephones from the Farmers Independent Telephone Co., and that the line be connected by under ground conduit, to pole line. Phones to be at a cost of \$36.00. Conduit work to be at cost. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the offer of the City Plumbing and Heating Co., of Boulder, Colo., to equip the jail and janitor residence with heating plan, in accordance with plans submitted to the board is accepted. Carried.

Moved by Floyd McCall that the county furnish no aid to the poor of the county other than support at the county poor farm, except by special order of the board. Seconded by Ohmstedt. Carried.
