Tall baskets of Killarney roses were found on each side of the altar. The bridal couple were attended by Miss Florence Malone, sister of the bride, as maid of honor, Miss Pauline Gellatly, sister of the bridegroom and Miss Adeline Keller as bridesmaid. The only other attendant was Jean Hopping, who carried the ring in a pink rose bud. The simple ceremony was pronounced by the Rev. L. D. Young of the First Presbyterian church. The bride's gown was of white satin trimmed in princess lace and pearls and was made en train. A Dutch veil completed the wedding costume. She carried white roses with a shower of lilies of the valley. The pink and green effects were carried out in the dresses of the attendants as well as in the decorations. The maid of honor wore pale green brocade en train, and she carried pink roses. Miss Keller was arrayed in a dress of pink satin trimmed in white brocade velvet and white tulle. 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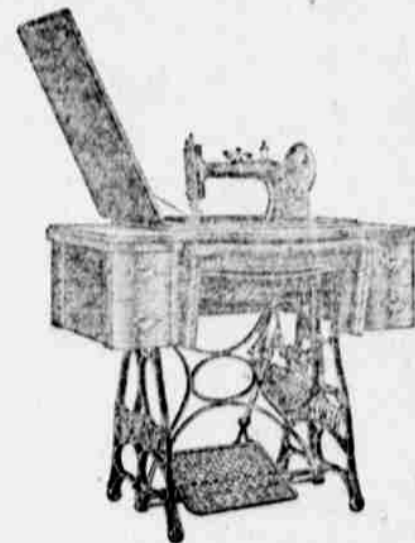
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
